- 11) Application of the scientific method:  
BWH predicts numerous transitional forms (above)  
BWH predicts new phyla should appear progressively thru time, but fossil record shows all 30 extant and numerous extinct phyla appear within 10 to 30 million yrs of Cambrian explosion, with no new animal phyla in past 500 million years.

#### DIALOGING ON EVOLUTION

Don't use vague, meaningless, slippery term "evolution."

Focus exclusively on scientific evidence for and against the Blind Watchmaker Hypothesis.

Don't allow rhetorical extrapolations.

Don't let theological opinions of what God would or wouldn't do be used as support for BWH.

Expose the presuppositional ideology inherent in the BWH.

It is scientifically OK and healthy to admit unanswered questions and unsolved problems.
