What do the words "salvation" and "saved" mean?

Ben Franklin is credited with having said, "A penny <u>saved</u> is a penny earned."

In one of my computer manuals, <u>Windows 3.11 for Dummies</u>, it says:
"<u>Save</u> means to send the work you've just created on your computer to a disk for safekeeping. . . . Files can be <u>saved</u> to a hard disk or a floppy disk."

Hillaire Belloc, visiting the graves of British soldiers who died in World War I, wrote: "They died to save their country, and they only saved the world."

Henry Carey wrote the famous words:

"God <u>save</u> our gracious king! Long live our noble king! God <u>save</u> the king!

And almost weekly we are urged to <u>save</u> the owls, <u>save</u> the whales, <u>save</u> the seals, <u>save</u> the wetlands, <u>save</u> the environment, <u>save</u> the children, <u>save</u> our culture, <u>save</u> the Social Security system, or <u>save</u> our country.
