And the very same thing is true in the case of the peace of which the prophet Isaiah spoke when he said, in reference to the Messiah, "There will be no end to the increase of His government or of peace." (Isaiah 9:7) This establishment of peace is not accomplished all at once, but in stages. First there is the removal of the great barrier to peace — SIN — through the death of Christ. Then there is the establishment of peace in the hearts of all who trust in Christ and His atonement. Then there is the establishment of peace in the external world by Christ's powerful rule during His millennial kingdom. And finally there is the establishment of perfect, everlasting peace in the eternal state.

Again, it is not the <u>weakness</u> of the atonement that prevented peace from coming immediately to the earth; it simply was not God's will to do it that way!

In all of these examples, it can be seen that Christ's atonement <u>purchased</u> these benefits, and that all of them flow from the atonement, but that God did not intend that they should be applied immediately, but in <u>phases</u> or <u>stages</u>.

Those who claim that <u>present healing</u> for <u>all</u> believers has been purchased by Christ stress various things in their attempts to support their view.

Sometimes they stress the implications of God's <u>love</u> and <u>mercy</u> for present deliverance from the effects of sin. However, they are <u>selective</u> in their identification of the effects of sin from which we are presently delivered. For example, they claim that present deliverance from <u>sickness</u> is provided, but not from <u>death</u>. But if God's love and mercy implies deliverance from <u>sickness</u>, would it not also imply deliverance from death?

Sometimes they stress the <u>greatness</u> and <u>power</u> of Christ's <u>atonement</u> to bring present deliverance from the effects of sin. But we have seen that a number of the benefits of Christ's atoning work are given in stages, according to God's Plan, and that this implies <u>nothing</u> about the power of Christ's atoning work.

Sometimes they stress the <u>will of God</u> regarding present deliverance from the effects of sin. But instead of getting information as to the will of God from the <u>revelation</u> of God's <u>Plan</u> in the <u>whole</u> of Scripture, they take some Scriptures, interpret them according to their own preconceptions, impose upon God what they think He <u>ought</u> to do, and thus come to conclusions as to what He <u>will</u> and <u>must</u> do! Needless to say, this is a bad way of discovering what the will of God is!

Sometimes they stress the <u>need for strong faith</u> in Christ's power and His willingness to give present deliverance from the effects of sin. However, faith is always a <u>response</u> to a <u>word</u> from God. Faith does not <u>create</u> truth; it receives and rests upon it. And God's Word of truth does not tell us that present healing from <u>all</u> sickness and suffering is a benefit available to all believers. Therefore all the faith in the world will not bring
